Presented for Mayor and City Council consideration is Resolution No. 22-49 for the purpose of approving an amendment to the urban renewal plan for the Story City Consolidated Urban Renewal Area

The proposed Urban Renewal Plan Amendment includes: A) Interstate 35 Bridge Approach Improvements Project, and B) Washington Street Union Pacific Railroad Crossing Safety Improvements Project.

RESOLUTION NO. 22-49

Resolution to Approve Urban Renewal Plan Amendment for the Story City Consolidated Urban Renewal Area

WHEREAS, as a preliminary step to exercising the authority conferred upon lowa cities by Chapter 403 of the Code of lowa (the "Urban Renewal Law"), a municipality must adopt a resolution finding that one or more slums, blighted or economic development areas exist in the municipality and that the rehabilitation, conservation, redevelopment, development or a combination thereof, of such area or areas is necessary in the interest of the public health, safety or welfare of the residents of the municipality; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Story City, Iowa (the "City") by prior resolution established the Story City Consolidated Urban Renewal Area (the "Urban Renewal Area") and adopted an urban renewal plan (the "Plan") for the governance of initiatives and projects therein; and

WHEREAS, an amendment (the "Amendment") to the Plan has been prepared which would authorize the undertaking of new urban renewal projects in the Urban Renewal Area consisting of (1) using tax increment financing to pay the costs of the Interstate 35 Bridge Approach Improvements Project; and (2) using tax increment financing to pay a portion of the costs of the Washington Street Union Pacific Railroad Crossing Safety Improvements Project; and

WHEREAS, notice of a public hearing by the City Council on the proposed Amendment was heretofore given in strict compliance with the provisions of Chapter 403 of the Code of Iowa, and the City Council has conducted said hearing on June 6, 2022; and

WHEREAS. copies of the Amendment, notice of public hearing and notice of a consultation meeting with respect to the Amendment were mailed to Story County and the Roland-Story Community School District: the consultation meeting was held on the 11th day of May, 2022; and responses to any comments or recommendations received following the consultation meeting were made as required by law;

NOW, THEREFORE, It Is Resolved by the City Council of the City of Story City, Iowa, as follows:

Section 1. The Amendment attached hereto and made a part hereof, is hereby in all respects approved.

Section 2. It is hereby determined by this City Council as follows:

A. The activities proposed under the Amendment conform to the general plan for the development of the City.

B. The economic development initiatives and projects proposed under the Amendment are necessary and appropriate to facilitate the proper growth and development of the City in accordance with sound planning standards and local community objectives.

C. It is not anticipated that families will be displaced as a result of the City's undertakings under the Amendment. Should such issues arise, then the City will ensure that a feasible method exists to carry out any relocations without undue hardship to the displaced and into safe, decent, affordable and sanitary housing.

Section 3. All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, to the extent of such conflict.

URBAN RENEWAL PLAN AMENDMENT STORY CITY CONSOLIDATED URBAN RENEWAL AREA

June, 2022

The Urban Renewal Plan (the "Plan") for the Story City Consolidated Urban Renewal Area (the "Urban Renewal Area") is being amended for the purpose of identifying new urban renewal projects to be undertaken therein.

1) Identification of Projects. By virtue of this amendment, the list of authorized urban renewal projects in the Plan is hereby amended to include the following project descriptions:

Α.

Name of Project: Interstate 35 Bridge Approach Improvements Project

Date of Council Approval of Project: June 6, 2022

Description of Project and Project Site: The Interstate 35 Bridge Approach Improvements Project is being undertaken by the Iowa Department of Transportation in connection with the resurfacing of the on and off ramps of Interstate 35 at the intersection of Broad Street in the Urban Renewal Area. The City will be responsible for paying the costs of resurfacing the bridge approaches situated within the public right-of-way of Broad Street.

It is expected that the completed Interstate 35 Bridge Approach Improvements Project will cause increased and improved ability of the City to provide adequate transportation infrastructure for the promotion of economic development and the growth and retention of commercial and industrial enterprises in the City.

Description of Use of TIF for the Project: It is anticipated that the City will pay for the Interstate 35 Bridge Approach Improvements Project with either borrowed funds and/or the proceeds of an internal advance of City funds on-hand. In any case, the City's obligation will be repaid with incremental property tax revenues derived from the Urban Renewal Area. It is anticipated that the City's use of incremental property tax revenues for the Interstate 35 Bridge Approach Improvements Project will not exceed \$200,000, plus any interest expense incurred by the City on any borrowing undertaken for the funding of the Interstate 35 Bridge Approach Improvements Project.

B.

Name of Project: Washington Street Union Pacific Railroad Crossing Safety Improvements Project

Date of Council Approval of the Project: June 6, 2022

Description of the Project and Project Site: The Washington Street Union Pacific Railroad Crossing Safety Improvements Project (the "Railroad Crossing Improvements") will consist of the construction of safety improvements to the Union Pacific Railroad system situated at its crossing with Washington Street in the Urban Renewal Area. The Railroad Crossing Improvements will include raising of the east rails; new signal houses; new signal mast arms: safety pavement markings; rebuilding the rail bed and redefining the roadway.

The City will only be responsible for covering five percent (5%) of the costs of the Railroad Crossing Improvements. The remaining costs will be covered by the Federal Highway Administration and Union Pacific Railroad Company.

It is expected that the completed Railroad Crossing Improvements will cause increased and improved ability of the City to provide safe and adequate transportation infrastructure for the promotion of economic development and the growth and retention of commercial and industrial enterprises in the Urban Renewal Area.

Description of Use of TIF: It is anticipated that the City will pay for the Railroad Crossing Improvements with either borrowed funds and/or the proceeds of an internal advance of City funds on-hand. In any case, the City's obligation will be repaid with incremental property tax revenues derived from the Urban Renewal Area. It is anticipated that the City's use of incremental property tax revenues for the Railroad Crossing Improvements will not exceed \$25,000, plus any interest expense incurred by the City on any borrowing undertaken for the funding of the Railroad Crossing Improvements.

INDEMNITY AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made by and between the City of Story City, Iowa ("the City") and Move Up, L.C. of Ankeny, Iowa ("Move Up"), WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City is desirous of facilitating the painting of a mural on the West wall of the former Ose Hardware building (now owned by Penn & Ross Properties, LLC and known locally as 515 Broad Street);

AND WHEREAS, Move Up is the owner of the vacant lot adjacent to the West, upon which vacant lot (known locally as 513 Broad Street) the persons painting said mural will need to place a lift or one or more scaffolds;

AND WHEREAS, the City understands that Move Up will desire to be indemnified from any possible liability or loss from allowing the use of their property as aforesaid.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto, in consideration of the foregoing and the mutual obligations and benefits hereinafter set out, hereby agree as follows:

1. Move Up agrees to allow the persons who desire to paint said mural to have access to Move Up's vacant lot known locally as 513 Broad Street, including the use thereon of lifts, scaffolds, ladders, and other similar equipment, for the purpose of painting said mural on the West wall of the building on 515 Broad Street. No rent shall be required by Move Up from the City for this access.

2. The City agrees to indemnify, defend and save Move Up harmless from and against any and all liabilities, losses, damages, judgments, costs, charges, counsel fees and other expenses, for any damage, accident, or injury of any kind or nature whatsoever arising out of the existence of this Agreement or the use of Move Up's vacant lot as described above, whether caused or suffered by Move Up or caused or suffered by any other person, persons or entity. 3. The City agrees to keep said vacant lot clean and free of all debris and refuse caused by or related to the use of the vacant lot as aforesaid. The City shall repair any damage caused by the mural painting project to said vacant lot or either adjacent building, at the City's expense, and shall return same to the condition they were in prior to the beginning of the mural painting project.

4. This Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, successors and assigns of the parties.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Story City, Iowa that Amendment #2 to the 28E agreement creating the South Skunk River Watershed Management Authority is hereby approved.

This Joint and Cooperative Agreement (hereinafter referred to as the "Agreement") is entered into pursuant to the authority of the *Code of Iowa*, Chapter 28E on this _____day of _____, 2018-2022 by and between Story County, Boone County, Hamilton County, Hardin County, City of Ames, City of Story City, City of Roland, City of Randall, City of Jewell, City of Ellsworth, City of Kamrar, City of Blairsburg, City of Williams, Story County Soil and Water Conservation District, Boone County Soil and Water Conservation District, and Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District and Hardin County Soil and Wat

WHEREAS, <u>Iowa Code section</u> <u>Code of Iowa Section</u> 466B authorizes two (2) or more political subdivisions, defined as including cities, counties and/or soil and water conservation districts, all of which must be located within the same United States Geological Survey Hydrologic Unit Code 8 watershed, to enter into agreement under Chapter 28E of the *Code of Iowa* to establish a watershed management authority to enable cooperation in supporting watershed planning and improvements for the mutual advantage of the political subdivisions involved; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to <u>lowa Code section</u> <u>*Code of Iowa* Section</u> 466B.23, a watershed management authority may perform all of the following duties:

- 1. Assess the flood risks in the watershed.
- 2. Assess the water quality in the watershed.
- 3. Assess options for reducing flood risk and improving water quality in the watershed.
- 4. Monitor federal flood risk planning and activities.
- 5. Educate residents of the watershed area regarding water quality and flood risks.
- 6. Allocate moneys made available to the authority for purposes of water quality and flood mitigation.
- 7. Make and enter into contracts and agreements and execute all instruments necessary or incidental to the performance of the duties of the authority. A watershed management authority shall not acquire property by eminent domain.

WHEREAS, Story County, Boone County, Hamilton County, Hardin County, City of Ames, City of Story City, City of Roland, City of Randall, City of Jewell, City of Ellsworth, City of Kamrar, City of Blairsburg, City of Williams, Story County Soil and Water Conservation District, Boone County Soil and Water Conservation District, and Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District and Hardin County Soil and Water Conservation District, all deem establishment of the Headwaters of the South Skunk River Watershed Management Authority (hereinafter referred to as the Authority), a watershed management authority encompassing all three Hydrologic Unit Code 10 (HUC 10) watersheds, to be of mutual advantage; and

WHEREAS, it is mutually desired to enter into this Agreement pursuant to *Code of Iowa* Chapter 28E for the purpose of establishing the Headwaters of the South Skunk River Watershed Management Authority to carry out watershed planning and improvements in the Headwaters of the South Skunk River Watershed.

NOW THEREFORE, it is agreed by and between the parties as follows:

SECTION 1. IDENTITY OF THE PARTIES.

SECTION 8. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

SECTION 9. SEVERABILITY/INVALIDITY.

9.1 If any term, provision or condition of this Agreement shall be determined to be invalid by a court of law, such invalidity shall in no way effect the validity of any other term, provision or condition

of this Agreement, and the remainder of the Agreement shall survive in full force and effect unless to do so would substantially impair the rights and obligations of the Cooperators to this Agreement or substantially frustrate the attainment of the purposes of this Agreement.

SECTION 10. GOVERNING LAW.

- 11.1 This Agreement may be amended at any time by an affirmative vote of the majority of the governing bodies of all Cooperators. Any Cooperator desiring an amendment to this Agreement shall notify the other Cooperators of its desire, and the reasons for the request.
- 11.2 Such a request shall be in writing to the other governing bodies of the Cooperators, and shall be considered by their governing body without unreasonable delay and within no more than ninety (90) days of receipt.
- 11.3 If the request is agreed to by the other Cooperators, each Cooperator shall prepare and submit to the others a certified resolution confirming the affirmative vote of the Cooperator's governing body.
- 11.4 The Amendment shall take effect ten (10) days following receipt of the last such resolution by the other Cooperators. Amendments shall be filled and recorded with the Iowa Secretary of State within thirty (30) days of the effective date of the amendment as required by Iowa Code section 28E.8(1)(b).

SECTION 12. ADDITIONAL COOPERATORS

- 12.1 A City, County, or Soil and Water Conservation District within the Headwaters of the South Skunk River Watershed who is not a Cooperator, may request, in writing to all Cooperators, to become a Cooperator.
- 12.2 Such a request shall be considered and decided by a 2/3 vote of the Board, and shall become effective when the new Party has signed the then-current Agreement pursuant to a resolution of its governing body and requisite filing with the Iowa Secretary of State and/or County Auditor has been accomplished.

SECTION 13. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT.

13.1 This agreement shall terminate upon the mutual agreement of the governing bodies of all Cooperators in the Authority. Upon termination, all property and money then owned by the Authority shall be distributed equally among its members after payment of all debts. Any funds donated under a stipulation limiting their use shall be dispersed consistent with the owner's direction. The governing body of each jurisdiction may individually terminate their participation in the agreement after providing the Authority a ninety (90) days' prior written notice of intent to terminate. Such termination shall be effective on the expiration of the ninety (90) days.

SECTION 14. EFFECTIVE DATE.

14.1 This Agreement shall take effect upon execution by the Cooperators as required by law, and filing with the Secretary of State in an electronic format.

SECTION 15. NOTICES.

- 15.1 Notices under this Agreement shall be in writing and delivered to the representative of the party to receive notice (identified below) at the address of the party designated to receive notice for each Cooperator as set forth in this Agreement. The effective date of any notice under this Agreement shall be the date of actual delivery of such notice and not the date of dispatch. The preferred means of notice shall be either actual hand delivery, certified US Mail, return receipt requested with postage prepaid thereon, or by recognized overnight delivery service, such as FedEx or UPS.

SECTION 16. FILING AND RECORDING.

16.1 It is agreed that Story County will file this Agreement with the Iowa Secretary of State pursuant to the requirements of Iowa Code section 28E.8(1)(a).

SECTION 17. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

17.1 This Agreement and attachments attached hereto constitute the entire Agreement, among the Cooperators and supersedes or replaces any prior agreements among the Cooperators relating to its subject matter, including but not limited to the 28E agreement filed with the Iowa Secretary of State on October 23, 2018 (Filing No. M511295).

SECTION 18. NO WAIVER.

18.1 The waiver or acceptance by any Cooperator of a breach or violation of any provisions of this Agreement by another cooperator shall not operate as, or be construed to be, a waiver of any subsequent breach.

SECTION 19. NO ASSIGNMENT OR DELEGATION.

19.1 Neither this Agreement, nor any right or obligation under it, may be assigned, transferred or delegated in whole or in part to any outside party without the prior written consent of all the Cooperators.

SECTION 20. AUTHORITY AND AUTHORIZATION.

- 20.1 Each party to this Agreement represents and warrants to the other that it has the right, power and authority to enter into and perform its obligations under this Agreement; and that it has taken all requisite actions necessary to approve the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement, and that this Agreement constitutes a legal, valid and binding obligation upon itself in accordance with the terms of the Agreement.
- 20.2 Each Cooperator to this Agreement shall supply to the Authority a copy of the resolution by the governing body of each Cooperator as evidence of the power and authority of each Cooperator to enter into this Agreement.

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21.1 The paragraph headings and captions set forth in this Agreement are for identification purposes only and do not limit or construe the contents of the paragraphs.

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22.1 The Cooperators agree that this Agreement has been or may be executed in several counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all such counterparts shall together constitute one and the same instrument.

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- 23.1 Within its available resources through funding or in-kind support, the Authority may employ one or more staff members.
- 23.2 In addition to other powers and duties, the Authority will oversee the performance of all staff members and in-kind contributions to the Authority of personnel, materials, and equipment.
- 23.3 Within its available resources through funding or in-kind support, the Authority may acquire or lease equipment and supplies necessary to its work, acquire or lease office space, acquire and manage facilities related to its work, and insure against identified risks.
- 23.4 The Authority may enter into cooperative agreements and other contracts with other agencies, entities, and individuals.
- 23.5 The Board may create committees and task forces to support its work and, within its available resources through funding or in-kind support, engage experts and consultants.

SECTION 23. SIGNATURE PAGES

23.1 The Cooperators agree that this Agreement has attached to it signature pages which shall be assembled and filed together with the Agreement and shall together constitute one and the same instrument. A completed copy of the Agreement with executed signature pages shall be sent to each Cooperator.

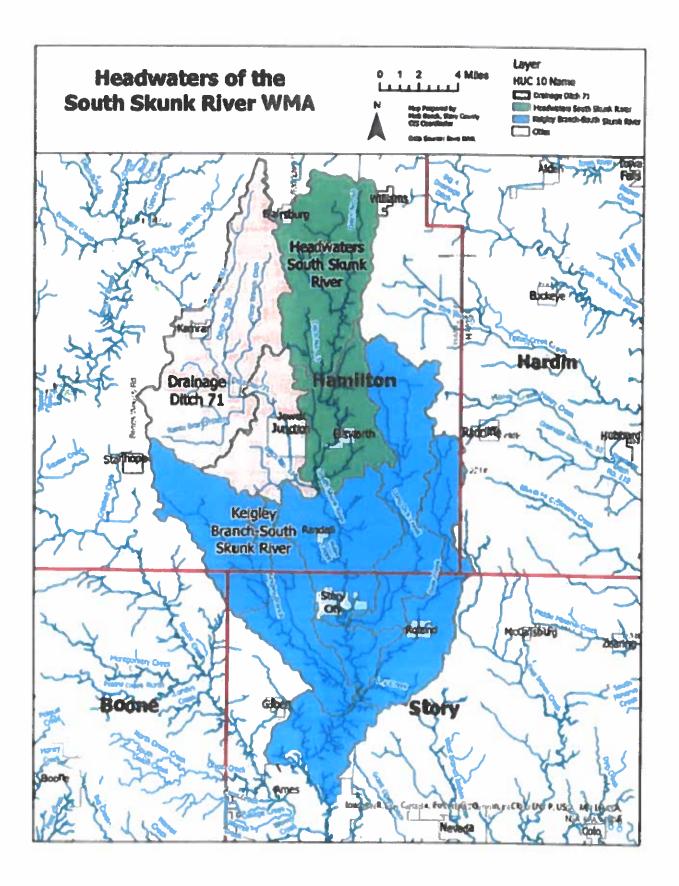

Since late February, the police department has been looking for candidates to fill our vacant officer position. It was a lengthy process and we received 30 names, ten of which returned a completed application packet. One applicant was previously ILEA certified.

I talked with a couple over the phone and brought in the certified applicant for an interview, after which he rode along with a couple of officers to get a good look at our department and the city. I am requesting approval to hire Hieu Shreffler, on the condition of successfully meeting ALL hiring standards set forth by the ILEA, to fill our vacant police officer position. Mr. Shreffler completed the ILEA through Polk County Sheriff's Office. Although he didn't work as a patrol deputy long for Polk County, he worked as a detention officer for their jail from 2008 to 2019. Shreffler also holds an Associate Degree in Criminal Justice.

Per Policy 4.02 regarding entrance salaries and past hires of police officers, and due to being ILEA certified, I propose Mr. Shreffler's pay to start at 88% of the base salary, as listed below (depending on the start date and increase of base salary wages):

First six months	88%	(\$54,249) or (\$56,419)
6 months to 12 months	91%	
12 months to 24 months	94%	
24 months to 36 months	97%	
End of 3 years	100%	

According to the Personnel Policy 3.03.4 Hiring and Wage Approval, Mr. Shreffler will start with a bank of 40 hours of vacation and 40 hours of sick leave.

Mr. Shreffler currently resides outside the 30-minute residency requirement as required in Personnel Policy 6.10. He lives in north Ankeny and according to Google Maps, it is typically a 33-minute drive to the Story City limits. I ask that his current residence be approved as compliant with the policy.

I anticipate Mr. Shreffler to start in late June or early July depending on the return of testing results.

On April 26, 2005, the citizens of Story City approved, with nearly 70 percent voting in favor, a Capital Improvements Reserve Levy for the primary purpose of financing a community recreation center and senior citizens center. Additional provisions of the ballot measures included that the tax levy rate would not exceed 30 cents and would be for a period of ten years.

On November 3, 2015, the citizens of Story City approved, with nearly 79 percent voting in favor, the continuation of the Capital Improvements Reserve Levy for the primary purpose of financing improvements to the North and South Parks. Revenues could also be allocated to the community recreation center, community/senior center, or Fairview Lodge. Additional measures included that the tax levy rate would not exceed 30 cents and would be for a period of ten years. The current Capital Improvements Reserve Levy would sunset at the end of Fiscal Year 2025-26.

The Library Board and Library Foundation have requested funding from the Mayor and City Council for a proposed library expansion project. Based upon preliminary Mayor and City Council discussion the City would:

- Present to the voters a ballot measure for the continuation of the Capital Improvements Reserve levy at a special election to be held on September 13th.
- If approved, the City would contribute a total of \$120,000, made payable in the amount of \$30,000 over four fiscal years beginning in FY 2023-24.

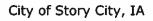
- 3) It is also proposed that revenues could continue to be allocated to the community recreation center, community/senior center, or Fairview Lodge. In addition, it is recommended that the Golf Course also be included on the ballot in which revenues could also be allocated.
- 4) If approved, the Capital Improvements Reserve Levy would be for a period of 10 years.
- 5) The Mayor and City Council would need to determine whether or not the tax levy rate would not exceed the current 30 cents rate (\$51,600) or consider a lower not to exceed rate of 25 cents (\$43,000). Note: the city council is not required to levy the full amount. The revenue amount and levy rate is determined each fiscal year during the budget approval process.

The Story County Auditor's office has indicated that the City has until July 26th in which to inform the auditor's office if it wishes to have a special election to be held on September 13th. The estimated cost for a special election is approximately \$3,000. Will the City be responsible for the entire cost or would part of the expense come from the Library Trust account or reimbursed from the Library Foundation?

Two other miscellaneous items the Library Board may request the Mayor and Council place on the ballot:

- > Expanding the board from five to seven members.
- ▶ Have a limit of two terms on the board. A board members term is six years.

Dear friend,

As you may know, Cameron is a scout with our local BSA troop, and has thrived through his participation in such a wonderful program. It is easy for anyone to see in his countenance how greatly he's been impacted through the opportunities to serve and lead provided by scouting. Scouting has taught Cameron how to set goals, and he has set the goal to achieve the rank of Eagle Scout. You may have seen him working on merit badges or rank. What you may not know is just how great of an impact the scouting program has had, especially when considering his history, a history not many of his new friends know.

Cameron was first removed from his biological mother's care when he was two, after being locked in a hot room with his sick infant brother for many days (while his mother did drugs in the other room). His baby brother died from neglect, and when the police arrived, Cameron had gone several days without being changed. It was from this horrible situation that Cameron started his journey into our world; from this trauma he would continually seek shelter and respite, but not find it for over a decade.

Cameron lived off and on with relatives, his unreliable biological father, and in shelters for the next 13 years of his life. He attended eleven different schools before his sophomore year. He spent six months living in a shelter for homeless youth, waiting for a foster home. He was finally able to move in with his father following his time in the shelter, but it did not end up being a safe home for him. Three months in, the recurring domestic violence in that home finally moved him to our home in an emergency placement. That means he was picked up from school and taken to a completely new home. He arrived with totes of thrown together belongings, clothes that didn't fit, and in need of vital medical care.

As we tried to find our normal, and reach some level of routine, news of a new sickness began to spread. Two weeks later, COVID-19 shut down schools completely. It was during the mess of COVID, that we all lived through, that Cameron was invited to his first scouting activities.

Since joining scouts, he has quickly moved up in the ranks. He has earned many merit badges, teaching him valuable life skills. Even more, prior to joining scouts Cameron used to say that he "just improvises" in life. He did not know how to set goals, and frankly did not want to, because he had never been able to achieve goals before. He has learned leadership skills, made friends, and loved all his time as a scout. Unfortunately, his eighteenth birthday arrived too soon and has stopped his goals in their tracks.

Earlier this year, Cameron, his scoutmaster and I wrote letters to request an extension to allow Cameron to have the eight months more he needs to achieve the rank of Eagle Scout. Taking into account both Cameron's unusually unfortunate history and his exceptional progression in the scouting program, we assumed the extension would be

granted. We were heartbroken to hear that our request was denied by the National BSA.

That is where you come in. A family connection, who was previously a scouting executive, has recommended to me our next course of action. He explained that the BSA is a 501(c)(3) corporation, and as such, they care about public opinion.
